More than a dozen Knights distributed the coats at Sugar Mill Elementary, Horizon Elementary,

Spruce Creek Elementary and Port Orange Elementary in Port Orange; South Daytona Elementary and Turie T. Small in South Daytona; Holly Hill Elementary in Holly Hill; and West Side Elementary in Daytona Beach. Horizon Elementary received the coats for the first time in the expanded drive.

## Christ Is Born! Glorify Him

rom the beginning of Salvation History, caused by the Fall of Adam and Eve, God the Father has intervened into our space and time on a frequent basis. The proof of this begins in the Old Testament, that book that chronicled the beginning of Salvation History.

God intervened in His world when He created Adam and Eve. He intervened again when He called Abraham, Noah, and Moses to develop a new Covenant with Him. God built a new nation with a set of Laws and fulfilled His promise that He would be the God of Abraham's posterity and that they would be His people. In all of this, God had a plan and a purpose. He had an objective that would change the face of the earth and of

all creation. He was about to establish the final Covenant with His people.

To understand the genesis of this new Covenant, we have to go into the New Testament. The New Testament was going to expose to us and to the world the absolute love God had for His human family.

It took twelve generations for God to root that first Covenant in His people Israel, but, after those twelve generations, God the Father was about to intervene again into our space and time. It would be a spectacular event that would be even greater than the creation of the world.

This spectacular event can only be believed by people of faith. St. John in his Gospel proclaimed this spectacular event when he said: "In the beginning was the Word, the Word was with God, the Word was God, became flesh and dwelt among us." God, the "I am who Am" united Himself to the womb of the Theotokos, and

the issue that came forth was True God and True Man. Jesus Christ, the Messiah, the Son of God, became flesh to fulfill the promise made to Adam and Eve of a Savior.

With the birth of Christ, Salvation History did not end. In fact, it was renewed by Jesus and given as a ministry to the Apostles. In turn, the Apostles gave to those they baptized this same ministry

So, the birth of Christ that we celebrate is at least two pronged. First, we must thank God the Father for the Gift of His Son. Ultimately, that Gift will afford us forgiveness and opportunity gain eternal life. What a wonderful realization of the Incarnation of God into our world. Secondly, with this Gift given to us in the form of the Messiah, it demands Thanksgiving to Jesus, the Messiah, for His selflessness. That means we must live, in our lives, the ministry of Jesus Christ that was given to the Apostles and to us in baptism and chrismation. Our daily lives must reflect Jesus Christ

to others in love, mercy, and forgiveness. In the Eastern Church on December 25th, the people greet each other by saying, "Christ is born." The response is 'Glorify Him',' and that glorification comes in the form of our ministry to the people of God.

For those of you interested in future leadership roles, this book shares many of the experiences and challenges that I faced, hopefully, it can help you in your decision making process. Below are two excerpts from the book, I hope you enjoy them. Have a happy Advent and a most joyous Christmas.

#### **Excerpt from One Knights Journey –**

"The Newman Center was open most hours of the day and into the evening. I took full advantage and it was a great sanctuary in its own right. I used the coffee shop to study. I would also visit the chapel and talk to God, which helped me cope with day-to-day issues. One day, a particular man just appeared, dressed in nothing but a tattered tunic. He was barefooted with long black hair and a long black beard. He went by the name "Prophet John." He carried nothing but a tattered Bible. He was always making notes and highlighting texts in the Bible, whenever he was not preaching or talking with whomever would listen. John would

appear at campus events, either standing on a bench or another perch so he could be seen and heard. He blended in with the hippies and drew crowds of twenty or thirty, sometimes much larger.


On one occasion, we (Catholic Students) were anticipating the visit of then -Pope John Paul II, who would be celebrating Mass in Chicago. People were making plans to go to see the Pope. Our campus was located about sixty miles west of the city, and transportation was either by bus or private car. Profit John was looking for a ride to go to see the Pope. He wanted not so much to hear the Pope, but to share with him his message for repentance.

The pastor of our Newman Center was a very wise priest and on one occasion used "Profit John" as the topic of his homily. I still remember the theme of that message—how Jesus was treated by his own community. Though we all saw "Profit John" as just a hippy who liked to preach, our pastor pointed out several facts: 1.) Our Profit John never claimed to be anything other than a man proclaiming the gospel; 2.) Our Profit John did in fact quote directly from Scripture and did not deviate from or distort the message in any way; 3.) Our Profit John did follow the teachings of our Lord, Jesus Christ, taking literally the message Jesus gave to his disciples—to live by the means provided to him by those who took him in. His only possessions were the tunic and Bible, no money, nothing earthly. Our pastor told us "Who are we to condemn this man or call him a fraud?" "How do we know that he was not sent to deliver this message to us?"

Profit John disappeared one day, just as mysteriously as he had arrived. There was no sign of him ever again. I don't know if he made it to see the pope or if he had just moved on to another campus. But I do know that he had a lasting impact on me, regarding faith and conviction. He so

believed that he was willing to give up all earthly possessions to preach the Good News, even when being scorned and ridiculed.

There was always the one who needed his message, the one who would change his own life, pick up his cross and follow the Lord."
