Faith and Reason

"The world offers you comfort. But you were not made for comfort. You were made for greatness." - Pope Benedict XVI

he passing of Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI has left me reflecting on this theological giant of the Catholic Church. In many respects he seemed a contradiction to the world, not unlike Jesus whom he loved so much. As the Prefect for the Congregation of the Doctrine of the Faith for many years under St. John Paul II, he was seen as a stalwart guardian of orthodoxy. Yet, this brilliant academic appeared introverted and projected gentleness and humility, just as happy to avoid time in the public eye.



One of the things he is best known for is harmonizing and promoting the compatibility of faith and reason. In a postmodern world anxious to reject traditional wisdom and universal truths, he showed us that faith was not some romantic superstition for unquestioning minds, but the fruit of deep reflection on the truths of our existence. And he upheld universal truths in a time of increasing relativism.

positively was influenced by this Holy Father through profound experiences. The first was at World Youth Day in Madrid. Though it was not his first gathering with the world's youth following the death of St. John Paul II who pioneered the gatherings, in fact the first was in his native Germany in 2005 shortly after his election,

I had questions about how this very different pontiff could fill the shoes of his predecessor. Soon it was clear that the young people of the world embraced him, and his warm smiles communicated the same love of Christ. His words also carried similar profound wisdom and the youth were enriched on their pilgrim journey with Jesus.

The second influence he had on me was through his writing, clear and logical, yet with the heart of a pastor and good shepherd. His trilogy Jesus of Nazareth was wonderful to read. I wondered as I began the first book whether it would be dry and theological but was delighted to experience a personal encounter with Christ. The heart as well as the head of Pope Benedict presented the Jesus whom he loved. It helped reveal not only Jesus, but Pope Benedict to me.

Pope Benedict proved to be the good and faithful servant who gave his life for Christ and His Church in various ways over his lifetime ... priest, bishop, prefect and pope. Now we can pray that he enters into the reward prepared for him from the foundation of the world.

Celebrating the Theophany

n January 6th, the Eastern Church celebrated the Theophany, the baptism of Jesus. This is a great Feast that expresses a number of Truths of our faith. First of all. We recognize that Jesus had no need for baptism. Jesus Himself was baptism. He said to the people that unless you are baptized, you will not have life in you.

So, to emphasize the need for baptism, He offered Himself as an example to follow. As John said, he was not worthy to baptize Jesus. St. John understood that Jesus was baptism itself and told the people that there would be one coming that would baptize with fire and water. St. John even protested to Jesus that he should not baptize Him, but Jesus insisted.


Jesus wanted to use His baptism as a teaching example to others and yet, His baptism also initiated and inaugurated a greater event, which was the beginning of His ministry of salvation to all mankind and to creation itself.

Another reality expressed in His baptism is the realization of the Triune God. In the Old Testament, there is very little about the Triune God. What God did in the Old Testament was to gather a people together to become His people and gave them the Law to live by and

taught them how to worship Him. It would be in the coming of Jesus that the Triune God would be revealed. But, yet, there are some strong references or visions of the Triune God in the Old Testament.

In reading the Bible, it is important to listen to language. The words of the Bible offers us a glimpse into the reality of God. In the book of Genisis, we have to listen to the words of God in creating the world. In creating humanity, God says, "Let us make man in our own image. The language of God is referencing more than one person. In the

vision of Abraham seeing three men coming toward him, he recognizes them as angles, and he invites them to eat with him. This vision of the angles is called the "hospitality of Abraham" and the angels representing the Triune God. So. In the Old Testament, there are some references to the Triune God.

The beauty of the Feast of the Theophany of Jesus is that the baptism of

Jesus brings to the fore the full reality of the Triune God in all its glory. As Jesus comes up from the water, St John sees the Triune God in the form of a dove over the head of Jesus and a cloud over the dove. From the cloud St. John hears a voice that says, "This is my beloved Son in whom I am well pleased." Before St. John appears the Triune God. Father, Son, and Spirit. What a glorious vision to behold. What a gift given to St. John and through the Bible to each one of us.

When Jesus cured the sick, He, in some form, would ask them, "Do

you believe I can do this.". The answer was always yes, and they received a cure. In this Feast of the Theophany, Jesus asks us, "Do you believe in the One True God, Father, Son and Spirit." Through and in the Holy Spirit that we received in baptism, our loud response must always be, "Yes Lord, I believe." By our proclamation of, "I believe," we, through our own baptism, are given the ministry of Jesus Christ. It is that very same ministry that Jesus began at His own baptism.

Challenge by Supreme Chaplain Archbishop William E. Lori:

This month, I challenge you to give witness to your faith and love by supporting the pro-life cause in some concrete way, such as by donating your time or other resources. Second, I challenge you to participate in the ASAP, Novena for Life, and/or March for Life programs.

Questions for Reflection:

Are you willing to suffer as a disciple of Christ, as Jesus warned would happen? Do you sometimes fail to speak up for your faith or moral values out of a desire to be liked by others or to not "rock the boat"? What concrete, practical things can you do to strengthen your willingness and ability to publicly witness to your faith, even when it might be unpopular — or come with a cost?

Council Supports ASAP Program



otre Dame Council 10514 participated in the new Knights of Columbus Aid and Support After Pregnancy Program (ASAP) by presenting a check for \$500 to Alpha Women's Center in Bunnell.

Council 10514 has been supporters of the Supreme Council Ultrasound Initiative since 2017. They have partnered with Our Lady of Hope Council 8086 in Port Orange and the Laps for Life Program to purchase ultrasound machines for the following Crisis Pregnancy Centers:

2017 – Life Services (St. Augustine) that also serviced Alpha Pregnancy Center in Bunnell; 2018 – Women's Resource Center (Palatka); 2019 – Alpha Women's Center (Bunnell); 2020 – Grace House Pregnancy Resource Center (DeLand)' 2021 – St. Girard's (St. Augustine)

The new ASAP program supplements the Order's efforts to support pregnant women, mothers and their babies by serving pregnancy resource centers and maternity homes. Through ASAP, for every \$500 a council or assembly donates to a qualifying non-profit pregnancy resource center or maternity home, the Supreme Council will issue a \$100 grant to the same qualifying organization.

Pregnancy resource centers provide assistance to nearly 2 million clients each year. In 2021, Knights donated \$4.6 million and 469,000 volunteer hours to support these centers and the women and children they serve through cash donations and community service activities such as baby and maternity item drives. Through its Ultrasound Initiative, the Order also donated \$5.6 million to centers for the purchase of 163 ultrasound machines in 2021 - bringing its total donations since 2009 to more than 1,550 machines valued at over \$75 million. These life-saving organizations would not be able to provide the level of assistance women and children need without support from our Order and collaborating parish communities. Alpha Women's Center is also financially supported by Notre Dame Council and the Santa Maria del Mar Respect Life Committee with Baby Bottle Drives and Baby Showers. Knights of Columbus members, and their wives, also volunteer for Alpha Women's Center's annual Gala Benefit to assist with registration and clean-up.

Council Supports Police Department

ur Lady of Mount Carmel, Council 13300 in Wildwood, took action again this year to join forces with the Wildwood Police Department "Shop with a Cop" program and "Kids Central," which are both involved assisting those less fortunate children in the Wildwood community at Christmas.

The Wildwood Police Department takes great pride as the Christmas season unfolds, beginning with its "Shop with a Cop" program. The Wildwood School system identifies the many needy children within the school system and provides those names

to the Police Department. This year, 60 kids were paired with Officers on December 17 to shop at the Walmart on Route 466. The sponsoring Officer presented their assigned child with \$300 for them to spend on themselves for Christmas.

"Kids Central" serves the children and families in Circuit 5 (Citrus, Hernando, Lake, Marion and Sumter counties) each year by working with partners and donors to provide Christmas gifts to children and families in need. "Kids Central" works with the families to establish the needs and from those needs they establish a wish list including the child's likes, wants, and needs. This holiday season, with the help of their partners and donors, "Kids Central" is on track to serve 2200 children across Circuit 5.

In order to provide financial support to both these programs, Council 13300 held two different events, a social/fundraiser at the Havana Country Club in October and a Nativity Quilt Raffle from October to December.

The first event was a social for Brothers, spouses, significant others to gather at the Havana Country Club in the Villages during an all-day fundraiser.



In addition, Brother Knights volunteered their time to man the donation table at the entrance from 11 a.m. to 8 p.m. Any patron who added KOC to the top of their bill would have a portion included as a donation from the restaurant. At the conclusion of the event, \$579 was collected in the donation jar, \$310 in food donations, along with an additional donation of \$390 made by Brother Knight David Suleiman, the restaurant owner. Together, the total collected was \$1,279.

The second fundraiser was an unexpected donation made from our Grand Knight Bill Wirtz's wife, Joyce Wirtz. She had been given an unfinished quilt of the Nativity by a friend, and through hours of her patient labor, completed it in time to donate to our Council for a fundraiser. The timing could not have been a better example of "Keeping Christ in Christmas" than to be raffling off this beautiful Nativity Quilt. The total raised from this fundraiser was over \$1,600. Together, the Council's efforts provided almost \$2,900 for these designated charities.

On December 2, SK Bill Lowderman and SK Mike Grindel presented a check for \$1,500 to Captain Walker and Sergeant Perry of the



Wildwood Police Department. This amount was enough to sponsor five children for the Shop with a Cop event. A second check for \$1,000 was presented by SK Mike Grindel to Yvond Semso, Kinship Navigator for Kids Central in support of their Christmas gift program for the needy children in the Wildwood area. The remaining donations collected will be rolled over into the Council's 2023 Christmas fundraising account.

The Council thanks all our Brother Knights who participated in helping with these events, all those who attended the Havana Country Club fundraiser, and those who purchased Nativity Quilt raffle tickets. More importantly, they want to thank the Wildwood Police Department and Kids Central for all they do for our less fortunate children. Although we will not see these children's faces light up on Christmas morning, we know we did what we could to assist making this possible. For this, we are grateful to have been a part of making their Christmas a "blessed" Christmas, and Keeping Christ in Christmas!

behind us, it's a good time to check your council's progress towards earning the Columbian Award. The Columbian Award recognizes charitable service activities and fraternal programs.

The deadline for the Columbian Award Application (SP-7) is June 30, but there is no need to wait. A council may submit the application as soon as it earns four program credits in each of the four categories.

You may find it helpful to print a copy of the SP-7 form to use as a working copy. You could write on the form which programs your council plans to accomplish, and in the margin write the date by which you intend to complete them. As you complete each program, put a check mark next to it. Once you earn four program credits in each of the four categories, you'll be ready to submit your SP-7 for your Columbian Award.


Each program is worth at least one credit. Featured Programs are worth two credits. So, you could earn the sixteen

credits by completing eight featured programs, or some combination of featured and other programs.

The Featured Programs for 2022-23 are as follows: Faith – Refund Support Vocations Program, Holy Hour, Into the Breach, Spiritual Reflection; Family – Food for Families, Family of the Month/Year, Family Fully Alive, Family Prayer Night; Community – Coats for Kids, Global Wheelchair Mission, Habitat for Humanity; Life – March for Life, Special Olympics, Pregnancy Center Support, Ultrasound Support.

For this year, Ukraine Solidarity Fund support can be used in any category. Donations of \$1,000 earn one credit, and donations of \$4,000 earn two credits.

The SP-7 form and other information are available at kofc.org/fiaforms. The SP-7 will soon



- Articles need to be brief, highly relevant and actionable
- At a minimum, <u>Who</u>, <u>What</u>, <u>When</u> and <u>Where</u> needs to be in the first paragraph,
- Articles need to be brief, to-the-point and of interest to the entire State Council
 - o What is the event/activity about?
 - o Whom did it benefit?
 - o What was the result?
 - o Who are the key players/Knights?
- Similar story submissions will be consolidated/batched into one article by the Editors
- Authors must submit on time per the Editor production calendar- Deadline 1st of each month
 - o Late submittals will be placed farther down the newsletter or not published.
- Proof your article carefully for spelling and grammar before sending (use spellcheck)
- Document filename should reflect the office/title, i.e. State Deputy article
- Every Region needs to participate one page of the Invocation will be dedicated to each Region respectively
 - o If a region does not submit content their page will be eliminated from that issue
- Cover story submissions need to be submitted ahead of the deadline due to special photo editing
 - Cover story photos in portrait style at least 1mb in size not formatted or resized
 - o filename "Cover Story"
