## St Aloysius Gonzaga

St. Aloysius Gonzaga is honored as the patron saint of youth, students, plague victims, and those suffering from HIV/AIDS, as well as their caregivers. His devotion to serving the sick, even at the cost of his own life, made him a lasting example of compassion and holiness.

Born into Italian nobility in 1568, Aloysius was raised to inherit wealth and status, yet from a young age he felt called to a life dedicated to God. While studying in Florence, he made a vow of perpetual chastity at only nine years old. He later received his First Holy Communion in 1580 and continued his studies while serving at the Spanish royal court in Madrid. During this time, he discerned a vocation to join the Society of Jesus, also known as the Jesuits.

Although his father strongly opposed his decision, Aloysius remained steadfast. In 1585 he renounced his title and inheritance in favor of his brother and left for

Rome to enter the Jesuit order. Two years later, he professed vows of poverty, chastity, and obedience.

Despite poor health, Aloysius volunteered to care for victims during a plague outbreak in Rome. In 1591, after carrying an abandoned plague victim to the hospital and personally tending to him, he contracted the disease himself. He died peacefully on June 20, 1591, at just 23 years old.

He was canonized in 1726 and later declared patron saint of students, Catholic youth, and AIDS patients by successive popes.

Father's Day is June 21. When you think of the qualities of a good father, what comes to mind?

You might picture someone who leads by example, works hard, makes sacrifices, and loves unconditionally.

I think one of the most important ways a father shows his love is when he protects his family in this world that can be so uncertain.

For example, we can't always control what influence the world might have on our family's lives. That's why a father knows it's crucial to guard his family spiritually, leading by example in faith.

Similarly, we can't always predict how life circumstances might impact our ability to provide for our families financially. Will our employment remain secure? Will we experience a long-term disability? And, as much as we don't like to think about it, will the Lord call us home at a time we don't expect?

There are many unknowns, but there are things you can do to protect your family and build security. For example, you can guard your loved ones through life insurance, long-term care insurance and disability income insurance.

Before I close, I'd like to share a story about our Founder, Blessed Michael McGivney. When he was 20 years old and in seminary, his father, Patrick, passed away. This left young Michael uncertain whether he would need to leave seminary and work in a factory to support his siblings and widowed mother. Thankfully, his bishop intervened and provided financial support to allow him to continue his studies for the priesthood.

As a result of this experience, Father McGivney knew firsthand how the death of a loved one could bring about uncertainty for the family.

In founding the Knights of Columbus, he started an Order that allows Catholic men like you to be the protectors their families need — even during life's hardest moments.

I invite you to meet with me to review your current coverage or to partner in finding you the coverage to match your family's needs. I would also be glad to share some of the other services offered by our affiliates, including Knights of Columbus Asset Advisors and Knights of Columbus Charitable Fund.

### **The Month of the Sacred Heart, Furnace of Love and Mercy**

June enters the year like a heartbeat, steady and solemn, calling the faithful to contemplate the mystery at the center of all creation: the Sacred Heart of Jesus. In this month, the Church turns her gaze to the Heart that loved unto the end, the Heart pierced yet unbroken, the Heart whose every beat was a declaration that God does not love from afar but enters the wounds of humanity to transform them from within. The Sacred Heart is a furnace in which divine love burns without exhaustion. And it loves now from the throne of heaven with the same gentleness that once rested against the chest of the Virgin. To meditate upon this

Heart is to meditate upon the mystery of God's very being.

To live June rightly is to allow our own hearts to be shaped by His, softened where they have hardened and ignited where they have grown cold. And to my brother Knights, this month calls us to a deeper consecration, a renewal of our mission in the fire of His love. Let us become men of reparation, offering prayer for the sins that wound this Heart. Let us become men of courage, defending truth with charity and serving others with compassion drawn from the Heart of Christ. Let us enthrone the Sacred Heart in our homes and councils, reminding all who enter that His love is the true foundation of our families, our parish, and our brotherhood. June is the month when heaven shows us the divine Heart that has forever beaten for humanity. Let us respond with fidelity, allowing our lives to become living offerings of love, mercy, and devotion to the One whose Heart has already conquered the world.

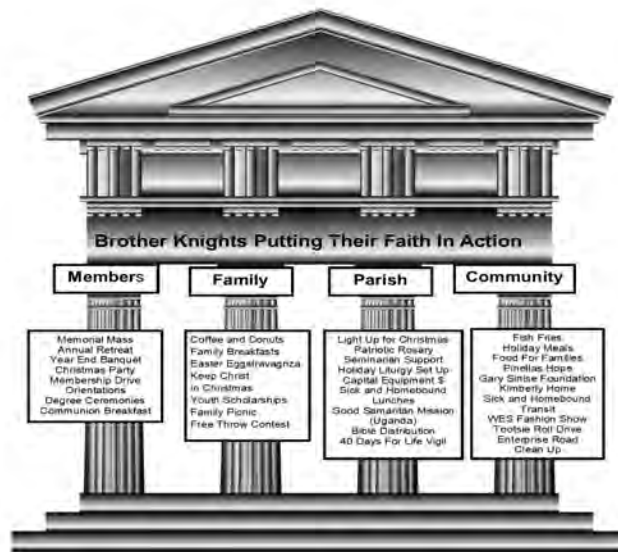

# In Memoriam

## James Richard O'Neill

June 11, 1941 – May 11, 2026



James Richard O'Neill, age 84, of Safety Harbor, Florida passed away on Monday, May 11, 2026. James was born on June 11, 1941, in Buffalo, New York to Robert F. and Florence E. O'Neill.

Jim joined the Air Force in March 1960. During his time in the Air Force, he was competitive in Judo and swimming. While stationed at MacDill Air Force Base, he met his future wife, Sylvia, at the service club dances on base.

In 1964, after his time in the Air Force, Jim joined the Clearwater Police Department as a Patrolman. He retired as a Captain after a 22-year career. In April 1965, he married Sylvia Penzato. They were married 61 years and had two daughters: Karen and Sharon.

After retiring from the Clearwater Police Department, he joined the City of Safety Harbor as a Code Enforcement Officer where one of his responsibilities was to instruct city employees on safety in the workplace. He retired in June 2003 after 16 years.

During his tenure at Clearwater Police Department, he earned his associates degree from St. Petersburg Junior College, attended the FBI academy, and was a member of the Fraternal Order of Police. He was awarded the Palmitier Award for assisting with an airplane crash, looking for survivors, and taking charge of the situation. He received several commendations for his alertness and dedication to duty, the apprehension of three burglary suspects, apprehension of car thieves, and rescuing 3 citizens from Tampa Bay in the face of heavy and dangerous seas after their boat capsized, averting a tragedy. He was an expert marksman and earned a spot in the Governor's 20.

He was a member of Espiritu Santo Catholic Church for over 60 years. During that time, he was active in the 3rd and 4th degree Knights of Columbus and at one time, held a seat on the parish council.

He was very active in both the City of Clearwater and the City of Safety Harbor communities. He was a mentor to many young men in the Police Athletic League and as a Boy Scout leader. He was a founding member of Paint Your Heart Out Safety Harbor and an active member of the Kiwanis Club for many years.

As a volunteer, he supported the Safety Harbor Library, Museum, Chamber of Commerce, Meals on Wheels, and coached his daughter's softball team.

As a veteran, he was a member of the American Legion and VFW.

He loved spending time with his family, playing cards, cruising, and traveling to the mountains. He was an avid reader, fisherman and hunter.

He is survived by his wife of 61 years, Sylvia O'Neill; their children, Karen Davis and Sharon O'Neill (Greg); their son-in-law James (PJ) Davis; grandson Austin (AJ) Davis (Venetia); three great grandchildren, Tyler, Keiden, and Rain; his sister Patricia Loretto (Robert); and many nieces, nephews and cousins.

He was preceded in death by his parents, Robert F. and Florence E. O'Neill, and his brothers, Robert and Thomas.

Cremation has already taken place, and a Celebration of Life will be held on Saturday, June 6, 2026 at 11:00 am at Sylvan Abbey Funeral Home and Memorial Park, 2853 Sunset Point Rd, Clearwater FL, 33759. Visitation will commence at 11:00 am, service will be held from 12:00-1:00 pm, inurnment will be across the street in the Memorial Park at 1:00 pm with lunch immediately following at Sylvan Abbey Funeral Home.

## Letter to the Editor

### I Will Not Leave You Orphans

We have just completed the Easter Season—a liturgical season marked by a wide range of actions and feelings. We have the horror, grief, and despair of Christ's passion and death. Then the exultant joy and amazement of His resurrection and time back in our midst. He gives us commands to spread the word of His ministry throughout the earth. But then he tells us that He is not here to stay. This causes tremendous confusion and anxiety among His closest disciples and followers.

In John 14, during discourse at the Last Supper, **Jesus said to his disciples: "If you love me, you will keep my commandments. And I will ask the Father, and he will give you another Advocate to be with you always, the Spirit of truth, whom the world cannot accept, because it neither sees nor knows him. But you know him, because he remains with you, and will be in you. I will not leave you orphans; I will come to you. In a little while, the world will no longer see me, but you will see me, because I live and you will live.**

In John 15, Jesus gives the disciples their charge. **"You are my friends if you do what I command you. I no longer call you slaves, because a slave does not know what his master is doing. I have called you friends, because I have told you everything I have heard from my Father. It was not you who chose me, but I who chose you and appointed you to go and bear fruit that will remain, so that whatever you ask the Father in my name he may give you. This I command you: love one another."**

These were indeed challenging and puzzling instructions, and the next day, they experienced the shock of Christ's capture, scourging at the pillar, crucifixion, and death. We know the rest of the story,

including the arrival of the Holy Spirit on Pentecost. As Bishop Barron says, once the Spirit came, twelve largely uneducated and timorous men went forth to spread God's word.

We, as Catholics and Knights, have committed to that same mission of sharing our faith freely and openly. Infused with that same Spirit of God, we've structured our work around the pillars of unity, charity, fraternity, and patriotism. We certainly are not timid in implementing our mission. And, as Christ told us two thousand years ago, He has not left us orphans. We are filled with His grace and Spirit.

## *From the Desk of Supreme Knight Patrick Kelly...*

### **To the Heights Together**

*In an age of loneliness and isolation, authentic friendship and fraternity help men discover and live their God-given mission*

One of the biggest problems of Blessed Michael McGivney's time was young men leaving the Catholic Church. He built our brotherhood, in part, to address that crisis, seeing that when Catholic men come together in fraternity, they can become who God made them to be.

This was one of Father McGivney's great insights - not only that men desire fellowship, but that they need it to find and fulfill their mission. This remains true today, yet we live in a time of isolation.

One man in particular puts a face on this crisis: Luigi Mangione. In December 2024, he allegedly killed UnitedHealthcare CEO Brian Thompson - taking another's life and ruining his own. Mangione is just 27 years old, and by all accounts had much going for him: academic success, opportunity, a Catholic upbringing. Yet something fundamental was missing.

In the aftermath of the murder, it became clear that Mangione was deeply isolated. He had cut off contact with friends and family. Alone with his thoughts, he turned toward a destructive end.

There are, of course, complex factors behind such a tragedy. But there is no question that a lack of real friendship made things worse. Mangione had no one to guide him.

Most disturbing of all, his story is not unique. It reflects a broader pattern among young people today - especially men.

A 2021 Harvard study found that 61% of 18- to 25-year-olds feel lonely most or all of the time. About one in four people under 30 report having no close friends. And over the last 35 years, the share of men who say they have no good friends has increased fivefold.

Catholics are not immune. In many of our parishes and schools, young men are searching - often in the wrong places - for purpose, identity and belonging.

But there is another young man who shows what is needed today: Pier Giorgio Frassati. Living in early 20th-century Italy, he took the opposite path from Mangione - a contrast that goes to the heart of what Father McGivney calls us to do.

Like Mangione, Frassati had much going for him - a good family, a strong education and an awareness of the challenges of his time. He refused to be indifferent to injustice and suffering, and he sought to take action. But while Mangione directed that drive toward evil, Frassati devoted himself to doing good.

Frassati's mission was to serve the poor. He gave them everything he had, including friendship, meeting them not as a volunteer but as a friend. He died at just 24, after contracting polio from those he served and loved.

What Mangione lacked, Frassati had: a strong Christian community. He surrounded himself with friends he called "precious guides," who helped him discover the mission God had chosen for him. Canonized last year by Pope Leo XIV, he remains a powerful witness today.

Frassati famously wrote on a photograph of himself climbing a mountain, "*Verso l'alto*" - "To the heights." And that is where he went. With the help of his friends, he continually sought God's will and, by his grace, climbed to the heights of heaven.

Father McGivney founded our Order to help us follow that same path. He built this brotherhood so that we could be guides for one another. This is what Blessed Michael McGivney calls us to in this time of isolation: to provide the friendship Catholic men need to find their mission.

We were never meant to go it alone. God created us for communion - with one another and with him. And his plan is that we follow that path together, so that we may climb "to the heights" in this life and the next.

That same call echoes today. It echoes in our parishes, in our communities, and in the quiet hearts of men who are waiting - perhaps without even realizing it - for someone to invite them.

### **That someone is us**

Each of us has a responsibility, not born out of obligation, but out of love. Love for our faith. Love for our families. Love for our brothers. And love for those who have yet to join us.

There is a certain joy that comes from inviting a man into this Order. Not because we are growing our numbers, but because we are changing lives. We are giving a man a path - a way to deepen his faith, to serve his community, to stand shoulder to shoulder with other men striving to be better husbands, better fathers, better disciples of Christ.

Think about the moment you joined. Think about what the Knights have meant to you. The friendships. The service. The faith. The sense of belonging. Now imagine that same gift waiting for someone else - waiting for you to extend the invitation.

### **This is where our work continues**

We cannot become complacent because a goal has been reached. We cannot slow down when there is still so much good to be done. If anything, this accomplishment should ignite us. It should inspire us to go further, to reach higher, to bring even more men into this brotherhood.

Because the mission has never been about doing just enough. The mission is about doing everything we can for the glory of God.

There are still lives to change.

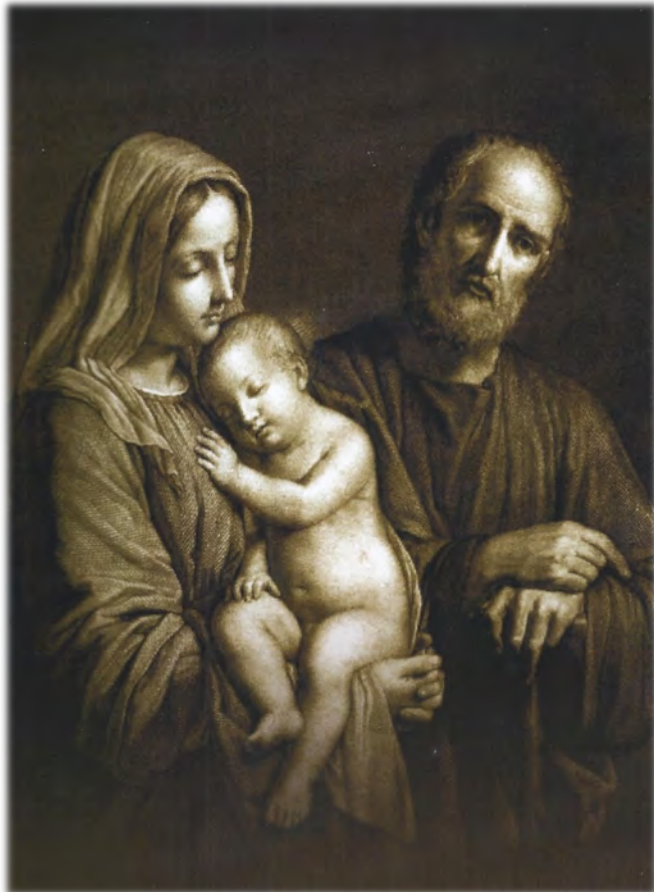
And together, with God's grace, we will continue this mission - not just until June 30, but for as long as we are called to serve.

Heavenly Father, thank you for the gift of our family. Enlighten our hearts and minds that we may live more fully this vocation to love.

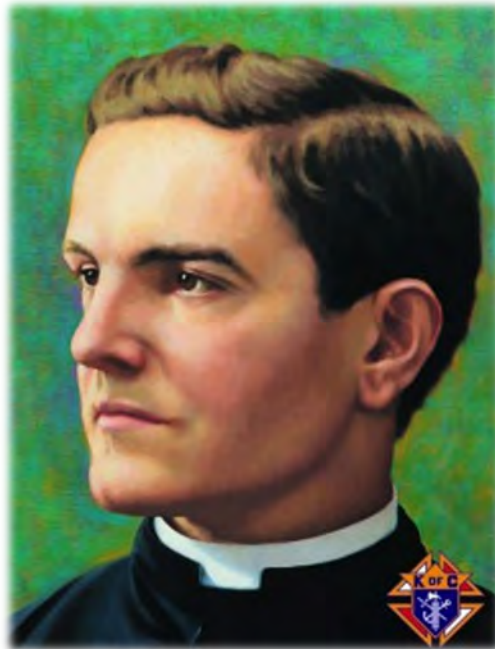
In our daily life and work,
